Symposium: Concrete Geometries – Spatial Form in Social and Aesthetic Processes at the Architectural Association

Concrete Geometries is a work-in-progress term derived from the synthesis of 'concrete', registering an existing reality or actual experience, and the abbreviation 'geometries', denoting spatial form. Set up as a research cluster at the Architectural Association School of Architecture, Concrete Geometries is seeking new ways of thinking about spatial form as a socially engaged and experientially relevant tool.

The day will be structured into two thematic fields and four discussion blocks. The format of each block is a series of four short illustrated presentations followed by a round table discussion. All sessions will be chaired by Marianne Mueller and Olaf Kneer together with an invited guest.

Walter Benjamin argues that the interaction with architectural space happens in a state of distraction ('Zerstreuung') or low level of consciousness. For works in this category processes of perception and their relation to geometry are in the foreground. Being revealed to a user / viewer, these often reach a state of awareness.
